



Henry wrote me that they were gone in less than an hour! Probably the best home baking the crew had seen in a long time.

Henry and my brother remained friends until my brother's death three years ago.



Helicopter crashes in field; two men aboard are injured

ICHWOOD, Ohio — At first, John Van Gundy didn't pay much attention to the helicopter flying above his farm yesterday afternoon. Van Gundy said he sees helicopters all the time over this rural part of Ohio, along the Delaware-Union county line west of Delaware. "People like to watch the cows," he said with a shrug. • But this helicopter started sputtering, and the noise made him look up.

"It just didn't sound quite right," Van Gundy said.

As Van Gundy watched, the helicopter headed toward the cornfield behind the barn where he keeps his cows and sheep.

Then it angled sharply and dived toward the ground.

Van Gundy, a former semipro football player, shouted for help and made a beeline for the field. When he got there, he found two men on the ground and the helicopter on fire.

The State Highway Patrol identified the men as 81-year-old Henry Brecher of Columbus and 50-year-old Todd Cramer of Dublin.

Both were conscious. They were stunned by the crash, Van Gundy said, but they talked to him and didn't seem to be burned.

One of the men looked frantically for his glasses. The other said his legs hurt.

Van Gundy helped the men move away from the wreckage. The wind picked up, and the fire started spreading, burning

through dried cornstalk remnants and sending black smoke into the air. It took firefighters about 20 minutes to put out the fire in the field; by the time they arrived, the helicopter was almost gone.

Another helicopter came and took Brecher and Cramer to Ohio State University's Wexner Medical Center. They still were being evaluated last night to determine whether they would be kept in the hospital. Their injuries weren' life-threatening, officials said.

Federal Aviation Administration records show that Brecher registered a helicopter in 2006. His helicopter is a RotorWay Exec 162F, which comes as a kit for aviators to build themselves. Cramer also has an airplane, those records show.

Investigators said yesterday

they didn't know what caused the helicopter to crash.

Van Gundy said he didn't know, either. He said he tried to keep the men calm while they waited for medics, and he didn't ask many questions.

"They were banged up, but they seemed like they would be all right," he said. "I told them if they were out (of the hospital) by Sunday, they should probably go to church." larenschield@dispatch.com

MEASUREMENT OF THE RETREAT OF QORI KALIS GLACIER IN THE TROPICAL ANDES OF PERU BY TERRESTRIAL PHOTOGRAMMETRY

ABSTRACT

The extent and volume of the largest outlet glacier from the Quelccaya Ice Cap (14°S, 71°W, 5200 m a.s.l.) has been measured four times between 1963 and 1991, once by aerial and three times by terrestrial photogrammetry. Drastic and accelerating retreat of the terminus and decrease of ice volume have been documented. The rate of retreat was nearly three times as fast between 1983 and 1991 as between 1963 and 1978 and the rate of volume loss was about eight times as great. These results are consistent with the behavior of tropical glaciers in the Cordillera Blanca in Peru and in the Ruwenzori Mountains and on Mount Kenya in East Africa.


INTRODUCTION

The Byrd Polar Research Center has been carrying out glaciological studies for reconstructing a climatic history for tropical South America on the Quelcaya Ice Cap in the Andes of Peru since 1974 (Thompson 1991, 1992; Thompson et al.1982, 1985, 1986, 1988, 1991). As part of these studies the extent and volume of its largest outlet glacier, the Qori Kalis (Figure 1), has been mapped four times and changes in its extent and volume have been determined.
























Tribute – Part 1 of 2

The first time I heard about Henry, like so many other people, I was utterly amazed to think that someone could be so dedicated and love what he did so much that he would continue to come to work after being retired for so many years. That said a lot about Henry and the Byrd Center.

In September 2022 when I had the opportunity to sit down and talk to him at one of our social events, I decided to speak German to him, knowing that he was from Austria. At the time, I didn't think he liked speaking German to me, and I thought maybe I overstepped, but shortly after the event, one day when I came to work, Henry had left a record behind my office door. We had briefly spoken about Vienna and opera at the event and so he had brought me one of his opera records to listen to, Johann Strauss' Die Fledermaus, a love story and comedy. Needless to say, I was grateful that he shared such a gift with me, and I was relieved to know that he appreciated our conversation.

Later on, when we reported on a story about the original Byrd Center flag in our September 2022 newsletter, Henry shared the following:

"You might perhaps be interested to know that I was (minimally) involved in the "creation" of the Byrd Center flag. Emanuel Rudolph, the Director at the time, asked me to take the design and have it made into the (cloth) flag; i.e. I was the errand boy or messenger for the job. I wonder whether the original had survived."

I started bringing in candy and filling the candy jar in the front office when I noticed that Henry would stop to take candy some days when he came in to pick up his mail. That brought me so much joy that I decided to continue to fill the candy jar. I continued to do this even after he was gone, in his memory.

Throughout the time I knew Henry he was quite open about when he was not feeling well and was unhappy, but I can say that during the last month of his life any time I saw him in the office and had a conversation with him, however brief, he was smiling and was happy and that is what I will remember when I think of Henry.

I was honored to meet and work with Henry. His legacy will live on at the Byrd Center.



On November 13th 2020, I gave a virtual seminar talk, presenting my research on the Guliya dust.


Throughout my presentation, I talk about brown and grey dust collected on filters.






